

OBTAINING PERSISTENT LINKS TO FULL TEXT ARTICLES

OPEN ACCESS JOURNALS WITH DOIs (Digital Object Identifiers)

1. Find an open access article that you are interested in. Sources of such documents include the [Directory of Open Access Journals \(DOAJ\)](#) and [Open Access Theses and Dissertations \(OATD\)](#).

2. Copy and paste the DOI into a text editor (the DOI is a unique and persistent identifier for each article).
3. Convert the DOI into a URL by adding this prefix "**http://dx.doi.org/**" (if it does not already contain it).
4. The example: **http://dx.doi.org/10.2174/1874123100802010001** is a persistent link to the article above. These only work if the source of the document is open access (i.e. free).
5. Test links prior to posting via email, course webpages, etc.
