


OBTAINING PERSISTENT LINKS TO FULL-TEXT ARTICLES

OXFORD REFERENCE

1. Display a full-text article or definition and click the “Cite” icon that looks like a little pencil:

4. Replace everything before **/view** with...

5. Test all links prior to posting them via e-mail, on course webpages, etc.
